SERVICE DEPARTMENT BUILDING UPDATE

Orange Village Council has determined the new Service Department will be located on the main municipal campus behind the Fire Department and in front of the cell tower. This future building will house Service Department vehicles and include a work shop, recycling storage space, locker room, and office space for the department. The salt storage and some cold storage will remain at the current Lander Road site.

An administrative committee has been working for three years to determine the needs of the Service Department for the next 20+ years, to recommend the site location and to create preliminary conceptual plans. This committee, headed by Mayor Kathy Mulcahy, worked with a representative from City Architecture, along with other Village Officials and recommended this site for Council's approval.

When the new Village Hall was planned in the early 1990's, it was designed to include the Service Department. However, in the final pre-construction stage, financial constraints required the elimination of the Service Department facility.

Now, 15 years later, our space requirements are so much greater.

It is always difficult to spend taxpayer dollars on something that we all tend to take for granted, but the reality is that building a new Service Department is long overdue. This new building will allow our Service Department to function more effectively and efficiently. The Service Department is essential to our community, providing leaf humus delivery, branch chipping, beautification and keeping our streets plowed in the winter and safe all year round.

Financially, Orange Village has been preparing for the new Service Department building for over 10 years. NO NEW TAXES will be levied for this project.

The next step is to search for and to hire an architect to finalize building plans. As these plans progress, look for information in the newsletter and notices of public meetings on this topic. As always, feel free to call your council representatives regarding this and/or other questions you have about your government in action.

2009 BUDGET APPROVED

The 2009 budget was recently approved. The Village's largest expense is the payroll for our dedicated staff. Second is the cost of equipment required to perform their tasks and duties. Fortunately, Orange Village has yet to experience any significant consequences from the current economic downturn ... though we continue to remain watchful. Nor have we had any increases or changes to our municipal income tax rates since 1982. However, Orange Village's budget, just like your own, is continually challenged by the increased costs of many basics...like fuel and utilities. Our finance department is very conservative in making budget projections... we estimate revenue resources on the low side and estimate expenses on the high side. Many budget requests are either deferred to future years or eliminated completely from consideration. Additionally, the staff remains vigilant and careful every day with the use of taxpayers' dollars. Consequently, we can, and will, continue to provide all of the services residents depend upon and we see no threat to that in the foreseeable future. I am happy to say, Orange Village is in a very good financial position.

Over the years, we have added many forms of communication with our residents. In just the past few years, we have expanded this newsletter, enhanced our web-site, conducted a community survey and initiated e-mail notices to those who sign up (Please go to orangevillage.com and sign up if you haven't already done so). We are always seeking additional methods for communicating with you. Orange Village instituted a "Reverse 911/Interactive" calling system. While its primary use is for emergency notification, the system has the capability of placing non-emergency, informational phone calls to everyone quickly, easily and economically (in fact it costs nothing to use this service for non-emergency calls). However, we are sensitive to those residents who may not want to receive non-emergency informational phone calls. Please read the REVERSE 911 article in this newsletter to learn how you can choose the option best for you. If you are not already signed up for the Reverse 911 service, please visit our website or phone the police department for more information.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Many thanks to those residents who have been affected by road construction this summer. Your patience and consideration are greatly appreciated. We hope the temporary inconvenience will soon be over and we will realize long-term benefit from the significant investment and improvements to our Village infrastructure.

SAFETY TIPS FROM THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Frequently residents go on vacations and leave their homes unattended. An “obviously” empty home is an easy target for a burglar. Here are some simple ways to avoid becoming a target:

- Complete a “vacation watch” by registering your home with the Orange Police Department
- When answering the door, ask to see proper identification; if the person is a salesman, solicitor, repairman or utility company representative, he or she will have proper identification.
- Never leave an extra key to the house in the mailbox, under doormats, over door frames or anywhere else --they are easily found.
- Have an alarm system professionally installed and activate it when you leave.

Lighting

Outside - Light up the side, back and front of the house and garage area with floodlights with sensors.

Inside - Leave a light on. Using a timer that turns on and off the lights is recommended.

Locks

- Make sure locks are away from windows (to prevent the window from being smashed and the burglar reaching in to unlock it).
- Use chain locks as an added precaution on all entries.
- Always install new locks in a home when moving in, even if it is a newly built home. This means back, side and front

doors. Never use locks someone else has had a key.

- Aside from locking the garage, never leave the key to the car or anything else in the car in the garage.

Windows

- Keep the shrubbery trimmed away from windows and keep it trimmed to a low height; they are excellent places for someone to hide and not be seen when burglarizing.
- Glass: use break-resistant glass at every window possible, especially in doors.
- Sliding doors are used frequently by burglars to enter. There should be two locks on such doors --- plus put a sliding board or broom handle braced inside the track to prevent the door from opening from the outside.
- Do not keep stock, bonds, coin collections and such in your home; put them in a safe deposit box at the local bank.
- If you cannot prove an item is yours, it will not be returned even if police have recovered it.
- Do not install a “doggie door” in any of your doors leading to the outside or into the garage; they can become “burglar doors” too.
- Report several “wrong number” calls you receive to the Orange Village Police Department and the telephone company; it could be a burglar trying to determine if anyone is home.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT NEWS

On July 30, 2008, the Mayor, members of her staff and members of Council met with representatives of the State Auditor's office to receive their report on Village finances for the year 2006. As in the past and for many years without exception, the Village has received a “clean” audit, the highest rating possible, which means that all Orange Village funds were properly received, accounted for and spent for municipal purposes throughout the year. The Auditor's representatives did suggest certain changes in the manner that Orange Village records its financial information; of course, the Village will comply and make the changes in technique that were suggested. Ironically, the Auditor's suggested changes were little more than a deviation from some changes previously suggested by a previous State Auditor some years ago, which the Village adopted when they were suggested. The Auditor's team indicated that they anticipate that the Village will receive a similar report regarding 2007, when that audit is undertaken later this year.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES



West Meadow Lane and Orange Hill Circle

The West Meadow Lane and Orange Hill Circle projects are completed. We would like to thank the residents for their patience and understanding during these projects. When working on a two-lane roadway, it is always difficult to do so without inconveniencing residents.

Some of the restoration areas may still need additional attention. The contractors are responsible for restoring the lawns. Once the seed is placed, the contractor will water every few days. Usually, this is enough to get the grass growing. By keeping the grass watered, it will grow thicker and reduce weeds. Without enough water, the grass will struggle and weeds will propagate. If the weeds take over, it means reseeding and delay. To avoid these problems, residents should also water the newly seeded areas thoroughly.

Wild Cherry Trail and Wild Cherry Oval

Orange Village has received bids for the reconstruction of Wild Cherry Trail and Wild Cherry Oval. If the bids are acceptable, the project will be awarded at the August Council meeting and construction could begin by mid to late August. Notification will be distributed to residents on those streets. We include all aspects of the project in this notification. We encourage each of the Wild Cherry residents to read the notification.


Document shredding was offered to our residents and the results are in:

- ❖ Over 90 residents were served
- ❖ By recycling 3.25 tons of paper we saved 55.25 trees
- ❖ We saved 9.75 cubic yards of landfill by recycling 3.25 tons of paper
- ❖ 195 pounds of air pollutants were saved by our efforts
- ❖ We saved 65 gallons of water by recycling 3.25 tons

PETIQUETTE

The Orange Village Police Department has experienced an increase in dog complaints over the past several months. We would like to offer a friendly reminder on pet etiquette as well as Village laws. All dogs must be registered annually with the Cuyahoga County Auditor. Upon registering you will receive tags for your dog to wear in order to identify him/her in the unlikely event your dog gets loose. If you would like more information about dog licensing, please visit the Cuyahoga County Auditor's website at www.cuyahogacounty.us. Please remember that all dogs must be confined to the owner's yard by using either a structural or electronic fence or a leash.



- ❖ All dogs will run off quickly if tempted no matter how well behaved or trained they are
- ❖ Don't assume that other dogs will be as friendly as yours
- ❖ Do not approach an unfamiliar dog
- ❖ Teach your children to ask the dog owner's permission before they pet an unfamiliar dog
- ❖ A dog that is kept outside for an extensive period of time should not be permitted to bark or to howl frequently and habitually. This is not only disturbing to your neighbors but **it is against the law**
- ❖ When walking your dog, keep them on a leash and remember to remove any "business" your dog might conduct during the walk

Document Shredding For Orange Village Residents

9:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

Orange Village will be providing residents with another opportunity to have their sensitive documents professionally shredded.

Each household may bring up to six copy paper boxes or 12 paper grocery bags full of paper to be shredded. (stapled paper is allowable.)

Paper shredding is a secure way to dispose of documents without fear of sensitive information being released into the wrong hands, while creating less of an impact to the environment.

This service is being provided free of charge to Orange Village residents.

CARBON MONOXIDE - THE INVISIBLE KILLER

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless and odorless gas known as the “invisible killer”. Every year more than 100 people in the United States die from unintentional exposure to carbon monoxide associated with consumer products.

What is carbon monoxide?

Carbon monoxide is produced by burning fuel. Therefore, any fuel-burning appliance in your home is a potential CO source. When cooking or heating appliances are kept in good working order, they produce little CO. Improperly operating appliances can produce fatal CO concentrations in your home. Running a car or generator in an attached garage can cause fatal CO poisoning in the home. You may also experience CO poisoning operating a generator or burning charcoal in the basement, crawlspace, or living area of the home.

How can carbon monoxide be released?

Carbon monoxide can be released into your home and cause respiratory damage to your lungs, or worse, death. The following is a list of items that may cause CO to enter your home:

- Fireplaces
- Heaters
- Hot Water Heaters
- Gas Stoves / Ovens
- Automobiles (Attached garages)
- Grills; propane, gas or charcoal
- Kerosene Heaters
- Dryers with clogged ductwork
- Nearby traffic



The Orange Village Fire Department is concerned for our resident’s safety and installing a CO alarm is a major step for your protection. Every home should have a CO alarm in the hallway near the bedrooms in each separate sleeping area. In addition, install battery-operated CO alarms or plug-in CO alarms with battery back-up in your home. The CO alarms should be certified to the requirements of the most recent UL, IAS, or CSA standard for CO alarms. Test your CO alarms frequently and replace dead batteries. A CO alarm can provide added protection, but is no substitute for proper installation, use and upkeep of appliances that are potential CO sources. Carbon Monoxide alarms can be purchased at any home improvement or hardware store with prices starting at \$20.00.

- Never plug a CO detector into an outlet that is controlled by a switch.
- Test your CO detector once a week by pushing the device’s button.
- Replace your CO detector every 5 years, unless the manufacturer recommends sooner.
- If the alarm sounds, evacuate your home and call 911 for assistance. Leave it to the professionals to determine the source of the Carbon Monoxide.

LAWN CARE TIPS

Summer is here and grass is growing, here are some tips you may want to consider:

Sharpen the blades on your lawn mower. Dull blades tear the blades of grass, which turns the grass brown. This may cause the spread of fungus disease.

Never cut your lawn too short. You never want to cut off more than 1/3 of the length of the grass blades at once. Recommended height for most lawns range from 2 to 4 inches, which is half the allowable length in our ordinance of 8 inches (Ordinance #521.11 TRIMMING OF TREES, SHRUBS AND WEEDS REQUIRED).

Change your cutting patterns. Try going in different directions and avoid making sharp turns.

Please be a good neighbor and keep up the general maintenance of your lawn and shrubbery. A new grass Ordinance (2008-19) is now in effect. If you’d like to read the ordinance in its entirety, our Codified Ordinances can be found on the website at www.orangevillage.com.

INFLUENZA PROGRAM - FALL 2008

The Orange Senior Center will again coordinate the Influenza program this year for senior adults of the Orange School District. They have secured Maxim Health Systems to provide and administer the vaccine. They have used Maxim for the past three years and have been very pleased with their service.

The Influenza Clinic is scheduled for **Friday, October 24, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.** at the Pepper Pike Learning Center. The Annual Community Health Fair will be held in conjunction with the clinic.

The influenza vaccine is covered by Medicare part B or participating health plans.

Orange Village will sponsor the cost of the vaccine for our senior residents 60+ who are not adequately insured and who are unable to pay.

CAREGIVER SUPPORT GROUP

ONE FREE CALL CAN SAVE YOU A LIFETIME OF DEBT

If you find that you are having trouble paying your mortgage or if you are considering buying a new home, refinancing your existing home loan, or if you are in foreclosure - you should call United Way's First Call for Help Line (2-1-1 OR 216-436-2000). This will lead you to a FREE session with a local housing counseling agency to determine what type of help is best for you. Many people do not realize the important role that housing counselors play in the current mortgage crisis. Lenders would rather help you work through the issues that you have, with the help of a non-profit housing counseling agency.

DIGITAL TV TRANSITION - FEBRUARY 17, 2009 ARE YOU READY?

Your TV signal is switching to "digital." For more than fifty years, TV broadcasters have sent their shows to your TV using "analog" signals. After February 17, 2009, most of the old analog signals will be gone and most of the stations you watch will use only the new digital signals.

Why Is The Government Switching to Digital?

For improved public safety for everyone. The transition to digital will help police, fire, and other public safety departments to communicate more easily with each other during emergencies. For you, digital TV offers better picture and sound quality, as well as more channels and programming choices.

What does this mean to you?

If all of your TVs are hooked up to cable or satellite, you will continue to get your TV after the switch. Just check with your cable or satellite company to be sure. If you have a digital TV you are ready for the switch (if your TV is more than 10 years old it probably is not digital. If it is less than 10 years old, ask the manufacturer if your TV is "analog-only".) If you have an analog-only TV with a roof-top antenna or "rabbit ears" you will not be able to watch most TV stations after February 19, 2009 unless you get a "converter box".

Converter Box?

The converter box will attach to your TV and let you go on getting free TV. With the converter box you can get a better picture and more channels. The antenna you have should work with the box. You can buy a converter box at most retail stores. The boxes will cost \$40 to \$70. You can get two \$40 coupons per household from the US Government to help you pay for up to two boxes. (One coupon per box only.)

RECYCLING CONTAINER INFORMATION

A blue recycling container will be delivered to each resident. These containers replace your current system of recycling (i.e., blue bags, grocery bags, etc.) Upon delivery, please begin using your new container to collect all of your recycling materials. You can mix all acceptable recyclable materials together in the new containers. Detailed information will be provided with your new container.

Tips

- ♻️ Your collection day remains the same
- ♻️ Do not line the container with plastic
- ♻️ Styrofoam is not a recyclable material and may not be added to recycled items
- ♻️ Place all your recyclables in the container
- ♻️ Even if your container is not full on pick-up day, you may place it out for collection or save it until the next pick-up day
- ♻️ All containers are the property of Orange Village and should remain with the dwelling.
