Chuck Fink Thursday, June 25



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SAFETY FIRST

Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms save lives. They should be installed on every level of your residence. After installation, test smoke alarms at least once a month and take time to replace batteries as needed. Since the kitchen is the most common area for household fires, your alarm may sound even from burning toast. Do not remove the batteries to stop the beeping. There are alarms available that have a temporary mute button for situations like this. For added protection, keep a fire extinguisher available in a convenient area. Safety first -your life depends on it!

MORE SAFETY TIPS:

...Wear reflective clothing from dawn to dusk when running, walking or cycling.

...Children under 16 must wear a helmet when cycling on Village roads

...Open burning is not permitted

...Avoid using your cell phone while driving.

Simple Steps to Deerproof your Garden

- The best known deer repellent is an ordinary bar of soap. Hung from strings in trees or large shrubs, wrapped or unwrapped, the scent of the soap is said to keep deer away. The soap can also be placed at 10 to 15 foot intervals along the perimeter of your property or garden area.
- Another popular repellent is human hair. Ask your barber or hairdresser to collect a bag full of hair. Place a handful into the leg of an old panty hose and hang it from trees or shrubs or scatter it in your garden beds.
- Animal manure collected from zoo animals or your dog, is another form of repellent when placed around plants. The scent will frighten deer away and improve soil as well.
- Rotten eggs work well. You can make your own by mixing five whole eggs in five quarts of water. Add this mixture to a sprayer and drench your plants. Do this on a hot day and you'll smell it within a short time. For large shrubs and trees, drench rags in the solution and hang them from plantings.
- There are many commercial controls available. You'll need to spray them often because they only work on a temporary basis. Heavy rains diminish their effectiveness.

Keeping deer away is not easy. In some cases, your best solution is to select plants that deer don't seem to like, including a number of beautiful plants that tend to have a strong smell. For a complete list, visit the numerous websites listing deer resistant plants.

Dear Neighbor:

Welcome to summer in Orange Village! Now, is the time for warm weather activities. Orange Village is bustling this summer with many projects and community events.

Road Construction Projects

Of course, the summer also means construction projects will be underway in order to maintain and improve the Village's infrastructure. Chagrin Boulevard construction has already begun and will continue through August. The work on Chagrin Boulevard will take place in the evenings and traffic will be maintained. Orange Village has contracted with Perrin Company for the reconstruction of Beechmont Trail, north and south, which will begin in mid-June. We will also be resurfacing Pike Drive in July. The residents on each of the affected streets will receive more detailed information before the construction begins.

Finances

We have been working diligently on the 2010 budget which was presented to council at the June Work Session. There will be a public hearing before final passage at council's July meeting. In these uncertain economic times, we are being very conservative in estimating our future revenues and expenses. Of course, we keep a close continual watch on our taxpayer dollars and will be ready to react appropriately to any unexpected circumstances, should they arise. There has been a great deal of disturbing financial news, both locally and nationally, but at this time Orange Village's financial position remains stable.

The administration, in conjunction with the council finance committee chaired by Councilman Mark Parks, is planning to conduct a financial information session early in the fall. We hope residents will attend this important town hall meeting. We will be sending out more information about this presentation in the near future.

The first concert will be on Thursday, June 25th at 7:30 p.m. at the gazebo located behind Village Hall. In the event of inclement weather, the show will still go on inside council chambers. When you see Chief Kostura, be sure to thank him for 30 years of service to our community.


Community Garden

CREDIT CARD APPLICATIONS

If you're tired of receiving unsolicited mail, including pre-approved credit card applications, call 1.800.567.8688 or visit www.optoutprescreen.com. You'll be asked for personal information, including your home telephone number, your name and Society Security number. The information you provide is confidential and will only be used to process your request to opt out.

TELEMARKETING CALLS

A free, easy way to reduce the telemarketing calls you receive at home is to register your phone number at 1.888.382.1222 by calling from your home phone number. Or contact www.donotcall.gov you will receive fewer calls within 31 days of registering your number.

MAIL

You may register with the Direct Marketing Association's Mail Preference Service for a \$1.00 fee. Your registration will prevent you from receiving unsolicited mail for five years, but you will not stop receiving mailings from organization that do not use this mail preference service. You can register at www.dmachoice.org.

E-MAIL

To opt out of receiving unsolicited commercial emails visit the Direct Market Association's website at www.dmachoice.org/EMPS. Your online request will be effective for five years.

As always, call the Orange Village Police Department at 440.498.4401 to report any suspicious activity that pertains to your credit or finances.

Orange Village K-9 Unit



Sergeant Davis and K-9 Dexter work as a team to provide specialized services to the Orange Village Police Department. Dexter is a utility/narcotics dog trained in tracking, open area and building searches, officer protection, criminal apprehension, and drug searches. Constant work on obedience, agility and Dexter's searching capabilities keep him proficient in all areas. Combined training is done with other local police K-9 units within Northeast Ohio on a regular basis. K-9 Dexter is very valuable to the police department because his senses of hearing and smell are superior to his human partner. K-9 Dexter can perform a variety of tasks, including finding lost children, apprehending dangerous criminals, and locating drug-tainted money and concealed narcotics.

GRANT FIRES UP DEPARTMENT

Orange Village is excited to announce that the Fire Department has received a federal grant in the amount of \$51,200. This grant will be used to purchase cardiovascular and weight-training equipment, as well as providing funds for all-inclusive physicals. This Health and Wellness Program promotes a proactive approach to better serve our residents by ensuring the good health of the men and women who serve our community.





SUMMERTIME SAFETY TIPS

The Orange Village Fire Department is staffed 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Our personnel include paramedics who are trained to administer medications, monitor heart rhythms, perform advanced airway maneuvers and coordinate the treatment of advanced trauma. While we are always ready to spring into action, we hope to meet you under more pleasant circumstances such as during a block party visitation or during a fire station tour. Below are some summertime safety tips which will allow you to assist us in ensuring your family's safety.

- Keep children hydrated. Before prolonged physical activity, a child should be well-hydrated. During the activity period, a general rule of thumb is 5 ounces of cold tap water every 20 minutes, for a child weighing 90 lbs, and 9 ounces for an adolescent weighing 130 lbs.

- Your child must wear a helmet on every bike ride, even close to home. Many accidents happen in driveways, on sidewalks and on bike paths, not just on streets. Set a good example; whenever you ride, put on your helmet.
- Anaphylaxis is the result of an allergic reaction that develops into a life threatening condition. Bee stings and nut allergies, comprise a large percentage of anaphylactic reactions. If you or a loved one has a known allergy speak to your doctor about the importance of carrying an Epi-Pen. Know the signs and symptoms of a major allergic reaction and call 911 immediately if you see one or more of the following: 1) Hives or blotches on the skin 2) difficulty breathing 3) difficulty speaking 4) alterations in heart rate and 5) swelling of the lips and throat.



SELLING YOUR HOME?

Before an inspection can be conducted by the Fire Department, an application with a \$50 fee must be obtained from the Building Department. This fee also covers septic and well water inspection, if applicable. After obtaining an application, schedule an appointment for the inspection by calling Assistant Chief Bob Wilson at 216.469.1901. The requirements for passing a point of sale inspection for smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors includes the following:

1. Working smoke detector in basement area
2. Working smoke detector in main living area
3. Working smoke detector in sleeping area
4. Working carbon monoxide detector in basement area – if no basement then in area of the furnace
5. Working carbon monoxide detector in any room that is attached to a garage
6. Working carbon monoxide detector outside the sleeping quarters.
7. Additional smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors may be required in larger homes. This is at the discretion of the Fire Inspector.



The requirements for new construction differ from those listed above. Call the Building Department to obtain that list at 440.498.4400.
