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## A COMMUNITY FOR ALL GENERATIONS...

Past and present administrators of Orange Village have been looking into the future of the Village for many years. They were looking to build a new Village Hall, institute an expandable recreational facility for all residents and now to build a new Service facility on adjacent land which has become available to the Village.

**How has the vision played out thus far?** Starting in 1973 Orange Village purchased 31 acres of undeveloped land with the hope that one day it could be the site for the new Village Hall. Since then, 23 additional acres have been acquired by purchases and donations. In 1991, council passed an ordinance which imposed a \$750. impact fee on new construction. Funds are placed in the Village Recreation Capital Improvement Fund and are used for recreational capital improvements.

### What are the results of these wise and far-sighted acquisitions and fees?

- The Orange Village Hall, Police and Fire Departments and a beautiful gazebo/band shell
- Two baseball fields filled to capacity in the spring and summer with aspiring athletes
- One soccer/football field to encourage sportsmanship
- One basketball court where you have never heard such cheers
- A fully-equipped playground which is filled with laughing children
- Two pavilions for family picnics and parties
- A chipping and putting green to keep the golfers on top of their game
- A sledding hill for winter fun and an ice skating rink when weather permits
- One mile of paved nature trails, fitness stations and 3 information kiosks

The Community Park was added to the Cuyahoga County Green Space Plan that establishes goals for open space protection and restoration in Cuyahoga County, including significant improvements to quality of life, regional competitiveness green infrastructure, environmental and human health and recreational opportunities.

Orange Village now has the opportunity to purchase almost 10 acres of adjacent acreage. We can continue to expand the Community Park and construct and update our Service facilities for improved service to the residents. We can continue to look into the future of our community for the next generation of residents.



Dear Neighbors,

**Summer Activities:**

Summer is such a wonderful season in Orange Village. Our beautiful community park offers many opportunities for recreation and enjoyment. Orange Village residents will be featured performers at this year's Music at the Muni series and this year's Summer Salute to Orange Village features a beach theme capped off with our spectacular fireworks show. Dates are provided in this newsletter... please mark your calendars for these community activities.

**Purchase of the former St Margaret of Hungary Church land:**

Over the next few months we will also be talking about a very important issue affecting the future of Orange Village. Council has recently passed ordinances authorizing the purchase of parcels comprising approximately 10 acres at the northwest corner of Lander Road and Pike Drive. It is unfortunate, in my opinion, that there is some motivated, yet misguided, opposition to this decision. If sufficient referendum petitions are submitted, the question of whether to buy the land, or to not buy the land, will be on the ballot in this November's general election. If sufficient referendum petitions are not submitted, the Village will acquire the land pursuant to council's prior approval.

I believe, unequivocally, that the purchase of this property is in the best interests of our Village. Just to highlight a few of the many benefits to be gained for the future of Orange Village:

- Adds acreage to our park, including a beautifully landscaped retreat complete with amphitheater. This area would connect, by pathways, to our other park amenities.
- With 8000+ square feet of reusable construction space, we will save more than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) off the cost of renovating/reconstructing the service department facilities at its current location.
- All of your village services will be consolidated on one community campus.

Every inheritance tax dollar received has been set aside and saved specifically for this purpose. We have the cash in the bank. **This land purchase will not require any new taxes of any sort nor will we have to issue debt.**

**This is a "once-in-a-lifetime" opportunity for the Village.** If this issue does go to a vote, I urge you to become informed; read community news and attend the meetings listed in the insert devoted to this topic. Feel free to phone me if you have any questions, doubts and/or concerns related to this project. I think most of you will agree that we have an opportunity to ensure high quality services and green space/park lands in Orange Village for the generations to come.

## FBI LEADERSHIP SKILLS TRAINING GRADUATE

Congratulations to Orange Police Sgt. Nick DiCicco who has been a police officer in Orange since 2001. He recently completed ten weeks of training in leadership skills at the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. This training adds to his specialties including; forensics investigation, firefighter, paramedic and retired K-9 officer.



Some of the highlights at the Academy included learning about statement analysis, techniques for reading between the lines of a victim or suspect's statement and looking at structure, syntax and word choice to determine who is telling the truth. Other areas of training included law, behavior science, forensic science, understanding terrorism and terrorist mind-sets, leadership development, communication and health and fitness.

Nick also completed the Yellow Brick Fitness Challenge. – a six-mile run through a hilly, wooded trail, including running through creeks, jumping through simulated windows, crawling under barbed wire in muddy water and scaling rock faces with ropes. In addition he earned the "Blue Brick" for swimming 34 miles in ten weeks.



Nick stated that "...participating in the academy has made me a better father, husband and police officer. Networking with other officers from all over the world and making friendships that will last a lifetime were the highlights of the program."

## Helmet Safety

The Orange Village Police Department and community are proud to participate in the AAA Helmet Smart campaign.  Through this campaign we are encouraging parents to take an active role in their children's safety by having children wear helmets when riding their bikes.

This summer Orange Village police officers will issue a safety citation when they witness a bicyclist wearing a safety helmet. The citation can be redeemed at The Diner or Petezeria as a five dollar gift certificate. The recipient of the citation will also be eligible for a drawing for a bicycle from AAA.

Your child's bicycle is considered a vehicle and use of helmets can prevent serious injuries. As a reminder, under local Orange Village codified ordinance 372.12, children between the ages of five and sixteen years old are required to wear a helmet when riding a bicycle.

## Road Improvement Projects

The following are the infrastructure improvement projects for the 2010 Construction Season and the anticipated timeline.

### Miles / Harper Intersection Improvement

The work will create a right turn only lane for eastbound traffic at Harper Road to reduce the delay at the light for westbound traffic on Miles Road. A second portion of the project will install a traffic signal at the exit of the Miles Market. Construction for this project is anticipated to begin in the late summer/early fall.

### Fire Safety / Water Line Installation

Sections of water mains will be installed on West Woodcrest, Pike Drive and Jackson Road. Additional single hydrants will also be installed at the Harvard Rd/Lander Road, Smithfield Rd/Lander Rd., East Woodcrest/Miles Rd. and the Orange Place/Pinecrest Drive intersections. The project is currently in the bidding process. Grant money received for the project does not allow the project to be awarded prior to July. Construction is anticipated to begin in August and may be completed by late fall. Some final restorations may need to be addressed next spring.

### Miscellaneous Concrete Repairs

The Village Engineer is currently compiling necessary concrete repair areas throughout the Village. The project could be bid in July and awarded in August. Repairs would be completed in the early fall.

### Asphalt Rejuvenation Project


This work applies a rejuvenator to existing asphalt roads. The rejuvenator which helps extend the pavement life and reseals the road is applied in one day. The following roads will receive the application this summer:

- ❖ Brainard Rd(Emery Rd to Village Limits)
- ❖ West Orange Hill
- ❖ East Orange Hill
- ❖ Oxford Ct
- ❖ Sterncrest
- ❖ Capitol Hill
- ❖ Nob Hill



The project was awarded at the June Council Meeting. A construction schedule has not been set but the application for each road will be completed by the end of July (weather permitting).

# ST. MARGARET OF HUNGARY CHURCH LAND ACQUISITION



The Village of Orange has a “once-in-a-lifetime” opportunity to acquire 10 acres of land immediately adjacent to the current municipal campus. This parcel of land is located at the northwest corner of Pike Drive and Lander Road. Approximately half of the acquired land will be dedicated to green space in our beautiful park and will add recreational opportunities for our residents. The other portion of the property has an 8,000 sq ft building which will be retrofitted to accommodate our Service Department, whose current location at 4160 Lander Road is no longer operationally efficient or functional for our community’s needs.

Included in this insert, you will find information which was presented on June 2<sup>nd</sup> by the architectural firm selected for this project, Bialosky & Associates. Their analysis compared the two sites (4160 Lander vs. the Church property) for determination where to locate the Orange Village Service Department. Bialosky’s conclusion was in favor of the Church property due to its location, amenities, flexibility and over \$1,000,000 in savings.

Over the next few months we will be conducting many informational meetings, including tours of the present facilities and the proposed new facility. # Frequently Asked Questions

**Q. How will we pay for this acquisition?**

**A.** Since 1984, the Village has placed every dollar received from its Inheritance Estate tax collections into a separate account specifically designated for "Capital Improvements." The Village has saved enough to pay off the mortgage for the Village Hall and the excess continues to be set aside. As of June 15, 2010 we have \$1,064,387 in savings.


**Q. Will it impact other operations of the Village or add any additional tax burden to the residents?**

**A. NO.** This money comes from a specific revenue source (Inheritance Tax) which is not budgeted for day-to-day operations. This unpredictable source of money has never been used for Village operations and has been saved specifically for this purpose. In our General Fund, which is used for day to day operations, we have accumulated \$2.5 million dollars of unencumbered funds in reserve.

**Q. What will happen to the land and facilities located at the present site of 4160 Lander Road?**

**A.** Because we would have sufficient space to eventually move all Service Department operations to the Municipal Campus at 4600 Lander Road, we will gradually restore those 7 acres to residential building lots and sell them when market economic conditions are more favorable. If we did not acquire the Church property, we could not eliminate our continued need for the 4160 Lander Road location.

## Fire Department Receives Grant

The Orange Village Fire Department received a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA ) totalling \$46,075. The grant will be used towards a purchase of a vehicle stabilization kit including high and low



pressure airbags used in motor vehicle accidents, two thermal imagers, a concrete cutting saw and a host of other equipment used to protect our personnel from fire and related hazards.

## Weathering the Storm - Tips on Tornado Safety

- Listen to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio or television newscasts for the latest information.
- Look for approaching storms.
- Look for the following danger signs:
  - Dark, often greenish sky
  - Large hail
  - A large, dark, low-lying cloud (particularly if rotating)
  - Loud roar, similar to a freight train.

### What to Do During a Tornado

**If you are under a tornado WARNING, seek shelter immediately!**

If you are in:	Then:
A structure (e.g. residence, small building, school, nursing home, hospital, factory, shopping center, high-rise building)	Go to a pre-designated shelter area such as a safe room, basement, storm cellar, or the lowest building level. If there is no basement, go to the center of an interior room on the lowest level (closet, interior hallway) away from corners, windows, doors, and outside walls. Put as many walls as possible between you and the outside. Get under a sturdy table and use your arms to protect your head and neck. Do not open windows.
A vehicle, trailer, or mobile home	Get out immediately and go to the lowest floor of a sturdy, nearby building or a storm shelter. Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes.
Outside with no shelter	Lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the potential for flooding. Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safer in a low, flat location. Never try to outrun a tornado in urban or congested areas in a car or truck. Instead, leave the vehicle immediately for safe shelter. Watch out for flying debris. Flying debris from tornadoes causes most fatalities and injuries.

## In Case of Emergency....

Orange Village, in cooperation with the Chagrin Falls Dispatch Center, offers a reverse 911 service free of charge to all residents. This is a community notification system which allows telephone messages to be automatically broadcast to the Village as a whole or to a specific portion of the Village that is directly impacted by the emergency. The system is used to deliver alerts when there is a threat to the public health or safety of the residents of Orange Village.

The system also has the capability of contacting you with non-emergency information phone calls

quickly, easily and economically (non-emergency calls are no charge for the Village). An example might be to remind residents about paper shredding, H1N1 vaccinations, or advise residents that trash/recycling pick up has been delayed.

- ⚠ Limbs should be placed with cut ends toward the road, no more than 2 feet high and 3 feet wide


